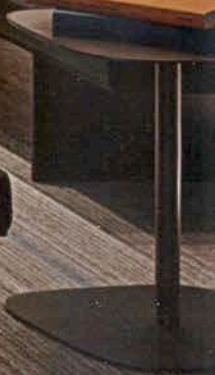
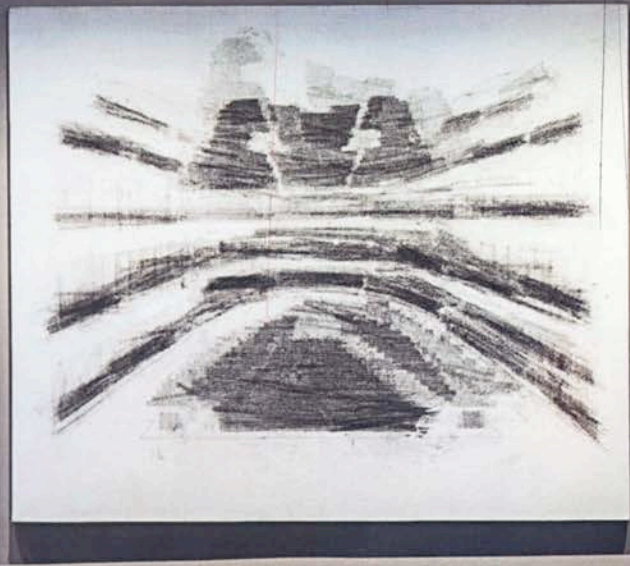

CORTE TRANSVERSAL



El proyecto Grupo Jumex se encuentra dividido en tres bloques, el primero destinado a las áreas de presidencia y dirección, el segundo aloja un área abierta de trabajo, rodeada de oficinas, y el tercero se encuentra integrado por el núcleo de accesos y servicios. Se hicieron instalaciones especiales de aire acondicionado y extracción, colocando controles de tiempo con horarios de funcionamiento, logrando optimizar recursos. Aprovechando las vistas y la luz natural, las áreas de trabajo se ubicaron en la parte central de un gran espacio abierto, donde las divisiones translúcidas, de cristal y celosías, ceden luz al interior. En direcciones y salas de juntas se retoma este criterio con plafones luminosos tipo *newmat*. En las oficinas de dirección se utilizaron maderas claras en pisos y algunos muros, dejando remates en materiales pétreos, logrando un ambiente cálido y contemporáneo.



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Grupo Jumex's project is divided in three blocks. The first one is aimed at presidency and directives, the second block hosts an open work area, surrounded by offices, and the third one consists of a nucleus integrated by accesses and services. Thus, special installations for air conditioning and extractors were built, adding timers with programmed schedules and optimizing resources. Making the best out of the view and natural light, work stations were located in a big open space, where lattice, translucent and crystal divisions let the light in. For directives and boardrooms, the same criteria prevailed in the form of luminous soffits that took after newmat designs. Light colored woods were integrated on floors and walls with stone endings, projecting a cozy and cotemporary environment.



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
